Language: Our value this half term is 'creativity'. Write a poem about being 'creative' or maybe you could create an acrostic poem spelling out the word 'Creativity'. Alternatively create a wordsearch with different synonyms for creativity.

People: It is World Red Cross Crescent day on 8th May. Spend some time researching the history of the charity and what they do to support children around the world. You might want to create a poster for their charity, write a letter to say thank you or create a fundraiser to raise money for the charity that supports people all over the world.



Britain: Visit Memorial Park and study the timeline of Newmarket's history. Are there any facts or historic events that surprised you or that you didn't know abut Newmarket?

Faith: James I was married to a Catholic Queen, and his mother had been a Catholic. So, when he came to the throne England's Catholics believed that James I might let them practice their religion freely. This was not the case and Catholics were fined, exiled and had their rights taken away. The gunpowder plotters were a group of angry Catholics, who did not like how King James was treating Catholics in England. Create a story board or comic retelling the gunpowder plot. The major parts of the story are: 1. The original plot. 2. The letter from Francis Tresham. 3. The discovery of Fawkes. 4. The torture of Fawkes. 5. Capture of the other plotters. 6. The trial and execution of the plotters.

**Migration:** Newmarket has a diverse population. Exploring our family history can help us uncover amazing things about our family and ancestors. These stories often feature migration: Aunts who emigrated, grandparents who immigrated or a great-uncle who spent years travelling the world. Explore your family tree and maybe find the stories hidden within.

**Creativity:** World Laughter Day is an annual event celebrated worldwide to raise awareness about laughter and its many healing benefit. This year World Laughter Day is on the 5th May 2024. See if you can create a game that links to laughter or makes someone laugh, why not try and create a book of jokes to share with friends, Create an outfit for your class teacher to wear that would make the class laugh.

Key word	Definition
Migration	People moving from one place to another
Immigration	The act of someone coming to live in a different country
Emigration	The act of someone leaving to go and live in a different country
Migrant	Someone who moves from one place to another in order to live in another country for more than a year. (The International Organisation of Migration estimates that 232 million people a year become international migrants and another 740 million move within their own countries).
Refugee	A person who has fled their country due to well-founded fear of persecution for political, religious or ethnic reasons, or because of war.
Asylum Seeker	Someone who has left their own country, often for political reasons or because of war, and who has travelled to another country hoping that the government will protect them and allow them to live there.
Economic Migrant	Someone who leaves their country and moves to another in search of better economic opportunities.
